The Early Ottoman Peloponnese Georgios C. Liakopoulos 2020-02-17 The Early Ottoman Peloponnese: A study in the Light of an Annotated edition of the TT10-1/14662 Ottoman Taxation Cadastre (ca. 1460-1463) is a study drawn from the author's PhD thesis, conducted at Royal Holloway, University of London, under the supervision of the late Professor Julian Chrysostomides. Liakopoulos explores the administrative and economic structures of the Peloponnese, and provides a detailed presentation their of agricultural production, fully illustrated with tables and charts.
